<p>Who were the first people to live in Ramsgate?</p>	<p>Archaeological Finds</p> <p>Maps</p> <p>Photographs</p> <p>Coins</p>	<p>Ramsgate - Stone Age to Iron Age Information PowerPoint In this PowerPoint, children will learn about the creation of the Isle of Thanet, after the area of Doggerland flooded due to rising sea levels. They will then discover how the Bronze Age and Iron Age influenced changes in the area.</p> <p>Burial Site Report Children will take on the role of an archaeologist and complete a burial report on findings within the Cliffs End dig. They will analyse the skeletons of human beings from the Bronze Age and make predictions about what the findings show. A completed report is included, so that children can compare their predictions to what was found.</p> <p>Coins of the Past Children will analyse two sketches of actual coins that were found in the Ramsgate area. They will then find out what changes took place during the Middle Ages.</p> <p>Tracing Caesars Steps – Newspaper Analysis Activity Children will analyse a news report about a recent discovery which points to the area of Pegwell Bay being the first location where Caesar and his Roman army stepped foot in Britain. <p>What was Ramsgate like during the Victorian era?</p>	<p>Maps Newspaper cuttings Photographs Paintings Engravings Posters</p>	<p>Ramsgate during the Victorian era PowerPoint Presentation This presentation will teach children about the Victorian era, how Ramsgate changed during this time and explore how transport links affected the town.</p> <p>Victorian Then and Now In this mix and match activity, Children will be provided with pictures of Ramsgate from the end of the Victorian era. They will also be given modern day images of the same views. They will have to study them carefully to match them together and can then compare them to see what has changed and what is the same.</p> <p>Victorian Buildings This activity will provide a template for researching a building in Ramsgate that was built during the Victorian era. It will encourage children to learn about the buildings in their town and feel a sense of pride in the place that they call home.</p> <p>Victorian Seaside This source analysis activity will have children studying photographs and postcards from Victorian Ramsgate to gain an understanding of the town's importance as a seaside resort.</p> <p>Extended Task: Can you find out about the posters that were used to advertise Ramsgate as a seaside resort?</p>	<p>Victorian, Queen Victoria, ragged school, Seaman's Infirmary, Sailors' Home, Smack Boys' Home, fishing smacks, Vincent van Gogh, Ramsgate Town station, Ramsgate Harbour station, railway, electric tram, St George's Hall, Ramsgate Pier, Sanger's Amphitheatre, The Granville Hotel, Ellington Park, County Roller Skating Rink.</p>
<p>How was Ramsgate affected by the World Wars?</p>	<p>Maps Newspaper cuttings Photographs Video footage</p>	<p>Ramsgate at War PowerPoint Presentation This presentation will teach children about World War 1 and World War 2 focusing particularly on the challenges that Ramsgate face during the wars.</p> <p>History Defenders – Ramsgate Tunnels Children will design a blue plaque for one of the men who were instrumental in the building of the Ramsgate Tunnels which saved so many life during World War 2.</p> <p>Comparing the World Wars In this task, children will use what they have learned about the World Wars, particularly the attacks on Ramsgate to compare and contrast the two wars and consider the impact that they had.</p> <p>Extended Task: Can you follow one of the suggested Heritage Trails?</p>	<p>World War 1, air raid, Zeppelin, altitude, war memorial, World War 2, evacuation, Ramsgate Tunnels, R.D. Brimmell, Mayor A.B.C. Kempe, air raid, Luftwaffe, Dunkirk, little ships.</p>
