Planning White Paper

Planning for the Future

- The government is consulting on the Planning White Paper, entitled <u>Planning for the Future</u>. Its stated aim is 'to streamline and modernise the planning process, bring a new focus to design and sustainability, improve the system of developer contributions to infrastructure, and ensure more land is available for development where it is needed'.
- The Planning White Paper consultation closing date is 29 October.

Legislation and Matters Arising

Emerging Legislation

Government Bills

Agriculture Bill: amongst other things the Bill authorises expenditure for certain
agricultural and other purposes; to make provision about direct payments following the
United Kingdom's departure from the European Union and about payments in response
to exceptional market conditions affecting agricultural markets; to confer power to
modify retained direct EU legislation relating to agricultural and rural development

- payments and public market intervention and private storage aid. The Bill is scheduled for the Third Reading in the House of Lords on 1 October.
- <u>Clean Air (Human Rights) Bill 2019-20</u>: amongst other things the Bill establishes the
 right to breathe clean air; requires the Secretary of State to achieve and maintain clean
 air in England and Wales; and to enhance the powers, duties and functions of the
 Environment Agency, the Committee on Climate Change, local authorities (including
 port authorities), the Civil Aviation Authority, Highways England, Historic England and
 Natural England in relation to air pollution. The Second Reading is still yet to be
 scheduled.
- Environment Bill 2019-21: amongst other things the Bill aims to make provision about targets, plans and policies for improving the natural environment, for statements and reports about environmental protection, conservation covenants, and about air quality. The Government have reintroduced the Bill and have said that it demonstrates a 'commitment to tackling climate change and to protecting and restoring our natural environment for future generations'. This Bill was being considered by a Public Bill Committee but due to current circumstances the sittings of the Committee have been suspended until further notice. The Committee is now scheduled to report by 1 December.

Private Bills

- <u>Desecration of War Memorials Bill 2019-21</u>. The Bill aims to create the offence of desecrating a war memorial. It was introduced to Parliament on 23 June under the *Ten Minute Rule*. Its Second Reading in the House of Commons is scheduled to take place on 5 February 2021.
- <u>Highgate Cemetery Bill</u>: The Bill needed a 'Wharncliff' Examination to comply with certain standing orders concerning the consents of owners, members and directors of companies. The Bill was found compliant on 9 March. The bill now proceeds to an Opposed Bill Committee to consider the petitions. A date has still not been set.
- Planning (Proper Maintenance of Land) Bill 2019 21. The Bill makes provision for increased fines for failures to comply with a notice under section 215 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990. Jonathan Gullis MP made positive reference to historic buildings and Historic England. It was introduced to Parliament under the Ten Minute Rule. Its Second Reading is scheduled for 20 January 2021.

Heritage Planning Case Database

 Historic England tweets planning decisions of heritage interest, via @HeritageAdvice, and these are then collated into the Heritage Planning Case Database. This is a searchable online database of appeal and call-in decisions relating to planning permission (that affects a heritage asset) and listed building consent. Cases have been summarised using a standard list of search terms, for ease of use; searches can also be carried out by address, date or decision reference.

Guidance

Permitted Development Rights and Changes to the Use Classes Order

- Facts sheets on <u>Permitted Development Rights and Changes to the Use Classes Order</u> were published by MHCLG on 18 September. They include:
 - Fast Track Planning for Brownfield Regeneration information on demolition of buildings and construction of new dwelling houses in their place.
 - Fast Track Approval for Building Upwards information on permitted development for building upwards.
 - o Flexible Use on the High Street information on Use Classes Order.

Forthcoming Historic England Advice

- Following public consultation, publication of a HEAN on *Commercial Renewable Energy and the Historic Environment* is expected shortly.
- Following public consultation, publication of a revised HEAN on *Tall Buildings* (HEAN4) is expected shortly.
- A HEAN on *Permission in Principle* is being currently being drafted and should be consulted on soon.
- A HEAN on Listed Building Consent is being currently being drafted.

Training

Historic England Training

- In response to Covid-19 restrictions, Historic England is increasing its e-learning and remote CPD provision.
- HE has turned the HELM courses planned for 2020 into webinars, including topics such as Enabling Development, Industrial Heritage and Design and Place-shaping. They can be accessed here.

Other Initiatives

Beauty at the Heart of the Planning System

- Robert Jenrick (Secretary of State) has <u>announced</u> steps to put beauty and design at the heart of the planning system.
- To support that announcement, Nicholas Boys Smith has been appointed to lead an
 expert group advising government on how to embed beauty and quality into the new,
 reformed planning system. The new design body is tasked with driving up design
 standards and supporting local communities to produce design codes defining beautiful
 design in each community.

Biodiversity Commitment

• The Prime Minister <u>committed</u> to protect an additional 4% of UK land to support the recovery of nature. The total commitment is for protection of 30% of UK's land by 2030, signed in the Leaders Pledge for Nature at the UN event on 28 September. The government has committed significant investment to support environmental enhancement and protection in England through the Nature for Climate Fund and the new Environmental Land Management (ELM) scheme.

High Street Heritage Action Zones

The High Street Heritage Action Zones programme was launched on 19 September. 68 high streets have been offered funding as part of a £95 million government funded programme being delivered by Historic England. This will unlock the potential for high streets, fuelling economic, social and cultural recovery.

Local Heritage Initiative

• Charles O'Brien has been <u>appointed</u> as government's new *Listing Heritage Adviser* to help communities protect historic buildings and monuments. He will work with councils to increase the number of buildings and structures of significant historical and cultural value that are locally listed, helping to protect them through the planning system.

Parliamentary Suburban Task Force

 The All-Party Parliamentary Group 'suburban taskforce' has appointed an advisory board and is progressing a public call for evidence, which is due to close on 2 October.
 Whilst the call for evidence is initially focused on London suburbs, the aim is to support the long-term sustainability of suburban areas at the national level.

Productive Placemaking Report

- The All-Party Parliamentary Group on *Building Communities* published the <u>Productive Placemaking Report</u> on the 22 September. The report recommended:
 - Placemaking should be incorporated at the heart of the NPPF.
 - Local industrial strategies should incentivise developers to share best practice as a driver of productivity.
 - Financial and policy structures need to be in place to ensure long-term management of place.
 - ONS must develop a measurement of placemaking and its link to productivity / GDP.
 - The government should aim to reduce the cost of land for the creation of affordable housing.
 - CIL should be replaced with a new Property Sales Levy.

Productivity and the Arts, Heritage and Museum Sectors Report

• DCMS has published <u>Productivity and the Arts, Heritage and Museum Sectors</u>. The report details the direct and indirect productivity of arts, heritage and museum sectors.

Current Consultations

- MHCLG is consulting on the *Planning White Paper* (see above). Consultation on *Planning for the Future* closes on 29 October.
- MCHLG is consulting on <u>Changes to the Current Planning System</u>. The consultation sets out proposals for measures to improve the effectiveness of the current planning system (closing date 1 October).
- The Department for the Environment & Rural Affairs is consulting on a revised draft <u>Waste Management Plan for England</u>. The Plan provides an analysis of the current waste management situation in England. It is primarily about the quantity of waste there is in England and how that waste is managed. The Plan sets out a summary of current policies, not new policies or announcements. It reflects the policies included in the Government's Resources and Waste Strategy, published in 2018 (closing date 15 October).
- The Department for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy (BEIS) is consulting on the <u>Review of Consents for Major Energy Infrastructure Projects and Special Protection</u> <u>Areas.</u> Views are being sought on a draft <u>Screening of Likely Significant Effects</u> report. The consultation closes on 9 October.
- The Department for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy (BEIS) is consulting on the proposed <u>Offshore Oil and Gas Exploration, Production, Unloading and Storage</u> (Environment Impact Assessment) Regulations 2020. The consultation closes on 2 October.
- The Department for Transport is consulting on <u>Pavement Parking: Options for Change.</u>
 The DfT is consulting on how the Traffic Regulation Order (TRO) can be improved, including for pavement parking. The consultation closes on 22 November.
