Heritage and the Economy London

The historic environment is intrinsically linked to economic activity, with a large number of economic activities occurring within it, dependent on it or attracted to it. Historic England commissioned Ortus to estimate the national and regional economic impact of the heritage sector using the latest statistical data. The study produces estimates of the heritage sector's impact using a method adapted from DCMS' Creative Industries Economic Estimates and uses the latest statistical releases. Please note that the 2017 Indicators use a revised methodology from 2016 to estimate heritage-related GVA. Net Economic Impacts

The heritage sector is an important source of economic prosperity and economic growth

Heritage directly contributed over £3.2 billion in Gross Value Added (GVA) in London in 2014. This figure increases to over £5.9 billion when direct, indirect and induced heritage GVA is combined. This is equivalent to 1.6% of total GVA in London.

Heritage is an important employer in London

In 2014, there were **over 30,700 people directly employed in heritage** in London. Including indirect and induced employment, this number increases to **over 50,300**.

London's historic environment is a unique asset that draws millions of domestic and international visitors each year

In 2015, heritage tourism generated over £13.4 billion in spending² by domestic and international visitors in London.³ In total, it is estimated that there were 1.9 million heritage-related domestic overnight trips, 36.7 million domestic day trips and 8.8 million international visits to London in 2015.

Heritage-related construction plays an important part in London construction industry

The built historic environment forms a vital part of our nation's infrastructure, providing premises for businesses; homes for residents; and amenities and utilities for communities and visitors.

Repair and maintenance of historic buildings in London directly generated £2.8 billion in heritage-related construction sector output in 2016. This is equivalent to 8.5% of total construction output in London.
