

AMPHORAE RIM FROM TOWCESTER

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TLR75 - 91 A rim sherd of a Camulodunum 186c (Beltrán IIA) amphora. This form has a broad neck and hooked rim, long flattened recurved handles, a body which widens towards the base and a long hollow spike. It was made along the southern Spanish coast, particularly in the Cadiz region, and carried mainly fish-based products (Beltrán, 1970; Peacock, 1971; 1974). The date range is probably Flavian, or shortly before, to the early second century A.D.
