

PETROLOGICAL EXAMINATION OF THIRTEENTH CENTURY BRICKS
FROM THE TOWER OF LONDON

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(DOE Ceramic Petrology Project)

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Three samples of early mediaeval bricks of likely thirteenth century date were submitted for thin section examination under the petrological microscope. The main object of the analysis was to compare the fabrics of the bricks to see if they might share a common origin - thought likely on documentary evidence to be Flanders (see elsewhere). Munsell colour charts are referred to, together with free descriptive terms.

- 1) AM Lab. no. 802772 From West curtain - 3rd loop North of Bell Tower.

Hard, rough sandy fabric, grey (2.5YR N6/) outer surface (heavily affixed with mortar), orangy-buff (5YR 7/6-7.5YR 7/4) core. Thin sectioning shows frequent subangular grains of quartz, average size 0.10-0.40mm. across, flecks of mica, ?chert, limestone, some argillaceous material and red iron ore.

- 2) AM Lab. no. 802773 From Tower Hill Postern.

Hard, rough sandy fabric, grey (10YR 6/1) outer surface, pale yellow (5Y 8/4) core. Thin sectioning shows a similar range of inclusions to AM Lab. no. 802772 above, but with a much higher proportion of limestone.

3) AM Lab. no. 820416 From Legge's Mount, layer 77, 36.

Hard, rough sandy fabric, light red (2.5YR 6/8) outer surface, darker red core (10R 3/6). Thin sectioning shows frequent well-sorted subangular quartz grains 0.10mm and under in size, together with some flecks of mica and a little felspar.

Comments

The range of non-plastic inclusions present in the above three brick samples are too common to indicate source areas without suitable comparanda from known origins. Sample no.3 (AM Lab. no. 820416) appears to be in a quite different fabric to the other two bricks. While nos 1 and 2 (AM Lab nos. 802772 and 820416) share some common features which may suggest production in the same general area.

TOWER OF LONDON: BRICKS:

Justine.

The story of the tower bricks is as follows: - Peter Curwen gave Leo a brick from the inner west curtain about 18 months - 2 years ago. This particular brick, along with 273 other, was ordered from Blowers sometime between 1276 and 1278.

Peter Curwen subsequently appeared with another brick this time from the recently excavated Postern gate of the lower bailey (no reference for either is known). The Postern is thought to be of similar date to the curtain wall and it was hoped therefore that an analysis of the brick would support this.

In 1283, a second order was issued for 120,000 bricks for use in the outer curtain wall. They were probably used in the embrasures and top of the wall, as evidenced when the wall was heightened later in the medieval period. A scatter of broken bricks was in fact revealed at the ground level within Brass Mount during excavations in 1926. It now seems reasonable to ask whether this equates with the 1283 purchase.

Finally, the interior of the garderobe chutes at Brass Mount are lined with brick. The Mount was raised at the same time as the outer curtain and it seems possible that the bricks were taken from the dismantled embrasures mentioned above. A sample from one of the chutes will be obtained in the very near future.
