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Agrea c.2.4 X 1.7 cm overall, replaced textile (negative impression). Opinning not clear; weave appears to be a half-basket (extended tabby) reave, i.e. with single threads in one system (normally the warp) and paired threads in the other (weft); thread count 9/11prs per cm.

Helf-basket was a popular weave in Roman textiles. Most of the English examples published by Dr.J.P.Wild (who has examined this coin) are woollens with rather finer counts (Wild 1970.46,90-91,94; Wild 1977. 9-11,27); replaced fragments on metal grave-goods from Winterbourne Earls and Kelvedon are rather coarser, and an impression on a pot from Gestingthorpe, Essex, could perhaps have come from light sacking (Crowfoot E. 1985, 97). A weave near in quality to the Housteads example was also found with coins, parts of a lined bag from Lackford, Suffolk, containing a 4th century coin hoard.
