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IMPORTED ROMAN MARBLE FROM LINCOLN

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Summary

Fifty-four small fragments of Roman marble veneers were examined. These came from a wide variety of sources, including: Euboea, Phrygia, Sparta, Thessaly, Peloponnese, Egypt and perhaps northern Italy or the Pyrenees. Of particular interest were a small number of fine-grained pieces of limestone, strictly speaking not marbles at all, although all had taken a good polish. The Boulogne region is tentatively suggested as a possible source for the latter fragments, though more work is needed to tie down the source with any confidence.

INTRODUCTION

Fifty-four, on the whole quite small, fragments of marble were examined and the majority identified. Most of these pieces were probably used as decorative veneers for floors and walls, though no. [19] may instead be a palette and no. [3] may have come from a moulding or column. The types of marble present are quite varied and include material from many different sources: *cipollino* from Carystos, Euboea; *pavonazzo* from Docium, Phrygia; *porfido verde* from Croceae, near Sparta; *verde antico* from Larissa, Thessaly; *rosso antico* from Cape Taenarum, Peloponnese; *occhio di pavone pavonazzo*; black porphyry from Mons Porphyrites, Egypt; pink veined marble from ?northern Italy [nos. 20 and 21]; and *marmor alabastrum* of unknown origin. The several pieces of white marble present are difficult to tie down, one veined fragment may possibly come from northern Italy [no. 23], while the other fragments could possibly originate from Carrara in Italy or perhaps St. Béat in the Pyrenees.

Five very dark grey pieces of fine-grained limestone are present [nos. 4, 12, 19, 43 and 44]. Strictly speaking these are not true marbles, but all have taken a good polish and should be included in the catalogue. Nos. [43] and [44] seems to have been obtained from a fine-textured shelly oolitic rock, while the other pieces are even finer-textured and appear to lack such inclusions. It is difficult to tie down a source, or sources, at present, though a possible source for these pieces may be the Jurassic formations in the Boulogne region. Also included in the group are two small pieces of stone with a British origin, again strictly speaking not really marbles although both have taken a polish. One is a fragment of Purbeck limestone from Dorset and the other a piece of micaceous sandstone from an as yet unknown origin, though most probably reasonably local.
