755000			MAN'S LATCHET TIE SHOE, LEFT FOOT, WELTED CONSTRUCTION. More or less complete except for heel. Reversed (or buff) leather upper - cowhide.	
			Extends backwards into a square-cut tongue; rear end of left wing now broken away but the end of the right wing has a butted seam, edge/flesh; stitch length 3.5 - 4.0 mm, showing as a ridge on the outside (flesh or suaded side) but invisible on the inside. This is where the vamp wing was butted to the front end of the quarter. Two holes at the vamp/tongue junction are where the latchet tie was inserted in its passage from one latchet	
			to the other. The <u>IASTING MARGIN</u> : (bottom edge) is still moulded and carries the welt sewing holes, stitch length 9.0 mm. At the toe end there are two deep creases where the two corners were formed to make a square-toed shoe.	
			QUARTERS: both left (outside) and right (inside) remain, but the left one would appear to have lost its original latchet, as a clean cut with grain/flesh stitch holes, stitch length 3.5 mm,	
			indicates that a new latchet (now missing) was added here. Both quarters have the following seams: (1) Front Edge: edge/flesh, stitch length c.4.0 mm where the vamp wings were butted and joined. (2) Back Edge: edge/flesh, stitch length c.4.0mm	
			where the two quarters were joined together. (3) Lasting Margin: (bottom edge) as far as the vamp, still moulded and carrying the holes for the welt sewing, stitch length 9.0mm. These holes are not only much more widely spaced than the	
			others, but are also much bigger themselves since the welt thread was much coarser and stronger.	
			The lower part of the backs of the quarters has been flattened into a more or less horizontal position indicating that the shoe continued to be worn when it was too small for the foot. There is an indication of a heel stiffener at the back of the quarters. TOE-PUFF:

765000			keep the block and support the toe. INSOLE: Complete, showing little wear; a very good example of a welted insole. The marginal edge/flesh welt-sewing holes have a stitch length of 9.0mm (as on vamp, quarter) and between the stitching channel there is the criss-cross impression of the bracing thread used to "last" the upper, i.e. to mould it to the wooden last. Various holes, especially at the heel seat and across the waist, indicate that repairs were carried out. The shape of the insole has three interesting features: (1) It shows the narrow square toe. (2) It shows the impression of the left foot with the raised inside arch and slight ridge behind the toes. (3) It is slightly "left-footed" which is unusual for the 17th century when shoes became straight.	
			A small portion remains carrying the insole/upper/welt sewing holes, stitch length 9.0mm, and the second row of welt/sole stitching holes, now deteriorated in most places. The cross-section moulding of the welt still remains. SOLE: (Original) The forepart and waist only remain and show the bracing thread impression on the immer surface. At least two sets of marginal grain/flesh stitching holes show where the original sole was stitched to the welt and where the repair clump was added later. The outer or grain surface (underneath) has vestiges of the	
			CUMP SOLE: (repair) This was stitched and nailed (scross the waist) on top of the original sole with two wedge layers inserted along the outside joint to build up the thickness here. Further wear took place and the margin of the cutside of the joint of the clump has now worn away, but at the inside joint the stitching channel is quite visible. HEEL PIECE: A small segment of leather, does not show any surface wear so may have been inserted between insole and sole heel seats when the heel (now missing) was attached.
