

## SOIL REPORT FOR THE SITE OF PENMON CROSS, ANGLESEY

The site of the c<sub>ro</sub>ss in Penmon Deer Park, Anglesey (National Grid Reference SH 626 808), was excavated by Mr C Smith from November 1976 to January 1977, during the removal of the cross to the Priory Church. The site is shown in Figure 1.


A possible buried soil was found under a lynchet (Plate 1) and duplicate samples taken for examination from the ? buried soil (PCS/76/Lc; AM No 770047), as shown in Figure 2.


The soil was non-calcareous, friable, medium sandy loam with moderate medium angular blocky structure. Roots were present (few, fine, fibrous), mottles absent and there were a few gravel - size stones. The soil colour (moist) was dark brown (10YR 3/3) changing to yellowish red (5YR5/6) after ignition. Loss on ignition for Sample 1 was 14.25% and for Sample 2 was 14.61%.


Soil colour and % loss on ignition indicated a soil organic matter content typical of an A horizon rather than subsoil horizons, ie. the colour was darker and loss on ignition greater than for mineral subsoil. Similarly, the presence of a friable, well-structured layer in such a position within the vertical section would indicate a buried A horizon.


## Conclusion

PCS/76/Lc (AM No 770047) probably represents the A horizon of a soil buried under the lynchet. As the soil was not examined in situ, it is not possible to further designate horizon notation.
